Our cultural celebrations, trainings and connective opportunities are guided by our DEI committees across the organization, as well as our annual Inclusion Survey. Program Spotlight: Home and Community Support Services



Danelle and her pre-adoptive parents, John and Katy.

Katy and her husband John met 11-year-old Danelle during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. Danelle was living in foster care and also happened to be a student at the school where Katy was an Assistant Principal. Katy noticed Danelle would go weeks without being in school and started to fall behind academically due to quarantine requirements. Danelle was also struggling emotionally due to being so isolated.

Katy and John were determined to get Danelle back in school and provide her with any additional support she needed to be successful. They decided to become Danelle's foster parents and eventually, they were introduced to Child and Family Services Home and Community Support Services (HCSS). The HCSS

Program identifies early needs for children and provides support from the comfort of their own homes. Cassandra Dunner, Clinical Supervisor, was assigned to their case and instantly developed a connection with Danelle.

Katy and John consider Cassandra part of their family and a safety network for Danelle. "Often, Danelle would call Cassandra when she was struggling mentally or emotionally," said Katy. "Cassandra was so supportive and helped guide her as she went through the process of returning to school."

Cassandra and Danelle utilized Dialectical Behavioral Therapy and Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EDMR) trauma therapy to determine what Danelle is most interested in and, subsequently, used those interests to navigate her emotional struggles and aide with trauma. Lately, Cassandra and Danelle have been engaging in interventions that provide her with self-confidence and reassurance, so she can overcome any obstacles she may face on her road to recovery. Additionally, Cassandra provided Danelle's family with resources and suggestions for family activities.

"There are so many layers, but with every step along the way, I never felt lost," said Katy. "I think that says a lot about how much Child and Family Services cares about the families they serve."

Not only has Danelle been making progress in school, but she has also been active with helping others. She created an Amazon wish list of games and fun activities for children who are part of the foster care community. Every day, she has received donations of items from her list.

"I want to give back to those who have gone through similar situations and for them to know they're not alone," said Danelle.

Cassandra has seen a significant growth in Danelle and is so proud of what she has accomplished. "This family has been such a delight to work with, even throughout their dark and stormy times," Cassandra said with a smile. "It has been an honor to see how John, Katy and Danelle approach challenges in life and work together as a unit to get through them."

Advocacy Leads to Increase Funding for Domestic Violence Survivors

On January 25, 2024, New York State Governor Kathy Hochul included \$120 million for crime victim service providers, such as Child and Family Services (C+FS) Haven House and Center for Resolution and Justice. Tiffany Pavone, Director of Victim Services at C+FS, has been advocating for this funding for years.

"It goes beyond domestic violence," emphasized Tiffany. "We had to bring attention to the victims who have been physically, mentally, emotionally and financially devestated by the crimes they've experienced and need to be supported."

In recent years, lack of funding has led to reduced wages and decreased staffing for domestic violence shelters across the state, which is detrimental to agencies that are already facing staffing shortages.

"Last year, we experienced a 30-40% loss in funds," explained Tiffany. "An additional 10% would mean domestic violence advocate positions would be eliminated and for other agencies, entire programs would be eliminated."

Tiffany worked with other domestic violence agencies across New York State who wanted to advocate for this funding. Last February, Tiffany spoke at the New York State's Coalition for

Domestic Violence's press conference regarding living wages for domestic violence advocates. It was crucial to make known advocates are excluded from the increases that direct service providers and essential workers receive. Additionally, Tiffany traveled to Albany to testify at a New York State Senate hearing regarding domestic violence services in the State and the need for more funding.

"What started as a downstate funding committee became a statewide advocacy funding committee," said Tiffany. "We took advantage of any opportunity we had to bring awareness and speak to our government representatives, local media and Governor Kathy Hochul. I want to thank all our local representatives who signed on to the letter raising awareness of the catastrophic cuts to VOCA. The advocacy is not done yet."

The Delta Kappa Gamma (DKG) sorority started as a secret society for key women educators in 1923, when women were not allowed to form clubs. Now, DKG is a nationwide organization that extends beyond retired educators. Diane Andriaccio and Frances (Fran) Romeo are proud members of DKG and through the society, they introduced their passion for Haven House to other members in the Western New York chapter.

"Haven House is our biggest community outreach project," explained Fran. "Our society is dedicated to helping Haven House because of the huge impact our contributions have on survivors."

Throughout the past 20 years, DKG has given over \$8,100 not including gift cards and gift in kind donations. Diane and Fran have led several

educational projects for children of domestic violence survivors, including "Mom and Tot Bags," which contain activities such as a dry erase board with markers, books for reading and a mat. The goal was to provide entertainment and educational activities for children so their parent could focus on counseling sessions and other appointments.

In addition to their dedication to children's education, DKG has arranged annual donation drives for collecting school supplies, mitts, hats and scarves. Diane and Fran have also shown their support by volunteering during Toyland, Haven House's annual toy donation drive, and attending Agency events such as Celebration of Friends and Fashion Show with a Twist. One of the events that stood out the most was the art show, which displayed artwork created by survivors of domestic violence.

"I remember attending the art show and seeing this beautiful suitcase created by a survivor," said Diane. "I read this heartbreaking story, and a woman approached me saying 'Don't worry, she's okay... She's my daughter.' I won't ever forget it."

Although DKG is involved with other organizations in Western New York, Haven House has always been a treasured cause and remains at the top of their list. Diane and Fran actively advocate all-year-round for Haven House and are devoted to fulfilling current needs for survivors. Their next project is gathering new purses and filling them with essentials.

"We are always asking if there's anything we can do to help," emphasized Diane. "We want to make a difference."

Child and Family Services (C+FS) recognizes the client experience and the employee experience are deeply interconnected. "We know people who feel connected to their work are more successful and have greater job satisfaction," stated Megan Andrews, Director of C+FS Employee Assistance Program and an organizer of the program. "Our hope is to create pathways for employees who are interested in leadership positions by providing informative content through the program."

Through this intiative, we hope to strengthen our ability to serve our community and develop leaders who embody the mission of "Nurturing a healthy and more equitable Western New York for the benefit of current and future generations."
